Handling and Administration of Emergency Medication

Epinephrine Auto-Injectors

Students that require epinephrine auto-injectors due to allergies must have an emergency care plan completed and signed by parents as well as a physician. Students that request to carry their auto-injector with them, must have it in their emergency care plan. There must be a notation of where the medication will be kept in the event that any staff need to acquire it for use in the event of an emergency. This medication will be administered by the school nurse or another specially trained faculty or staff. If appropriate may be administered by student.

Intranasal Midazolam

Students that require intranasal midazolam for seizure intervention must have an emergency care plan completed, and signed by parents and a physician. This medicine is a scheduled drug and will need to be kept locked in the nurse's office. Students or parents that request a student keep their medication with them, must have that on their emergency care plan. There must be a notation of where it is kept in the event that any staff need to acquire it for use in the event of an emergency. There must also be a written notice from their physician that they be allowed to carry the medication with them. This medication will be administered by the school nurse, or another specially trained individual who is in contact with the school nurse.

Diastat Suppository

Students that require diastat for seizure intervention must have an emergency care plan completed, and signed by parents and a physician. This medicine is a scheduled drug and will need to be kept locked in the nurse's office. Students or parents that request a student keep their medication with them, must have that on their emergency care plan. There must be a notation of where it is kept in the event that any staff need to acquire it for use in the event of an emergency. Glucagon
